A special meeting of the St. Clair Borough Council was held to review issues and finance on Thursday, March 2, 2023 beginning at 6:30 p.m.

In attendance were council members: Joann Brennan, Cheryl Dempsey, Thomas Dempsey, Judy Stednitz-Julian, President William Dempsey and Mayor Tomko. Absent were Thomas Adamchick and Tony Klazas.

Others in attendance included Borough Secretary Roland Price, Barbara Artz, and Police Chief William Dempsey.

Public Comment - No Public Comment

Secretary Price presented the Secretary's Notes.

President Dempsey opened the floor for discussion.

T. Dempsey mentioned Solicitor Brennan is looking into the Ordinance that covers dog feces as well as the requirement of leashes.

President Dempsey questioned when will the 3% raise for the Teamsters be made to the union membership. The Borough Secretary responded, once the contract is approved by Council, which will be at the next council meeting, the increase will be paid.

The police wage increases were discussed. The Police arbitration hearing is scheduled for June 5. President Dempsey would prefer the increase be given now, rather than wait for a lump sum payment in the future. Hopefully they can settle before June.

Police Chief Dempsey asked council to consider hiring William Kattner as a part-time officer to train the department. Mr. Kattner is a certified firearms instructor and defense tactics instructor. He will assist in training the department as needed if hired.

Officer Wiest was recently trained as a Taser instructor and Chief Dempsey and Officer Brennan were certified as First Aid/CPR/AED instructors.

Famous Reading Outdoors requested to have a town ATV ride on Saturday, May 13th.

Chief Dempsey requested permission for the following trainings:

Shaun Wiest to enroll in a Certified Field Training Officer class at a cost of \$499.00. Chief Dempsey be reimbursed \$1289.00 for Penn State's POLOX Training, and approval for Chief Dempsey to attend the Strategic Criminal Intelligence training in the amount of \$527.25.

A request to purchase parts to repair the light bar for approximately \$125 for the Chevrolet police cruiser.

Chief Dempsey provided a brief update on the Patterson Street truck situation. He also asked for authorization for our local police force to participate in roving DUI checkpoints, with up to five hours a week of salary being reimbursed through a program. He provided a document to be signed by the Borough Secretary and returned.

Mayor Tomko mentioned that Rick McShaw will be at the council meeting on Tuesday looking for answers. The situation has been deferred to Atty. Brennan. And Mayor Tomko questioned the zoning for the three apartments on 200 S. Second Street. He was concerned the apartments would become flop houses. Code Officer Brestowski inspected the apartments and there was no problem.

Borough Secretary Roland Price briefed Council on the properties at 26 S. Front Street and 146 N. Nichols Street both being considered for demolition. Depending on structural integrity at 146 N. Nichols Street. Engineer Baldwin will inspect the property. to determine the building stability. If it is found to be in imminent collapse, the borough will need to use our own demolition funds to demolish the structure on an emergency basis. If not, then an application will be submitted to the county's demolition department for consideration.

The counties Demolition Department agreed to demolish 26 S. Front Street using CDBG funding. The borough is responsible for 25% of the demolition cost if CDBG funding is used.

Schuylkill Transportation System (STS) is having a grand opening, RSVP is required.

Council discussed hiring a full-time police officer at the Tuesday meeting from the Eligibility List.

The council meeting adjourned at 7:16 p.m.

Pledge of Allegiance

Councilperson Joann Brennan read the council prayer.

President Dempsey called to order the March 2023 monthly council meeting.

Copies of the minutes of the previous council meeting have been given to Mayor Tomko and borough council members, are there any errors or corrections? If not, they stand approved.

PUBLIC COMMENT -

Rick McShaw and Jamie Van Boskirk appeared as a follow up to February's council meeting. Their complaint is the noise and trespassing of animals from their neighbor. They have been in correspondence with the Borough Secretary and Code officer Michelle Brestowski. An audio clip of the loud animal noises was played. Most recently Canadian geese joined the flock of other animals. Attorney Ed Brennan added that the property is zoned residential, it is no longer zoned agricultural, as it had been in the past. Solicitor Brennan recommended an alternate zoning officer be appointed to investigate the situation.

Comcast-

Attorney Ed Brennan updated Council on the Comcast situation. The Pole Attachment Agreement needs to be addressed. Electric Light Superintendent Bob Petrozino and Norm Barron of Utility Engineers surveyed the poles on Second Street. At least fourteen metal poles need to be replaced. Council reaffirmed only metal poles will be used. Keith Aldridge concerns were in acquiring the steel poles. Placing more wire at the top of the poles will put more stress on them. The work on Second Street may be deferred until a solution is

found. Make Ready work needs to be done prior to the project commencement. Discussion on who will do the "Make Ready" work ensued. Council considered assessing a \$200 fee per pole as part of the application fee.

Atty. Brennan, in his opinion, the project must go out on bid since the infrastructure is owned by the public. The matter will be researched. Jen Frees would like to work with Attorney Brennan so that a Pole Agreement will be on the agenda for the April Council Meeting.

Ashley Long of 20 W. Patterson Street has a concern of how the truck traffic by Miller's was handled. She feels that by correcting the problem, a new problem was created for her and her neighborhood. Chief Dempsey reassured her that the curbs painted yellow are legal now according to the vehicle code. They actually corrected an illegal situation. Chief Dempsey will work with Ashley to address the situation.

Famous Reading Outdoors representative, Andrew McNulty, requested Borough Council approve an ATV event scheduled for Saturday, May 13, 2023. He explained the event will be broken into segments so as to not overwhelm any one business.

The following is the status of engineering services performed by our firm as of this date:

ENGINEERING CONSULTATIONS & CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Famous Reading Outdoors (31433.02, Task 3)

On January 26, 2023, our office participated in a second teleconference with representatives from Famous Reading Outdoors (FRO, Andrew McNulty), Lehigh Engineering (LE, James Moore), PennDOT, and DNCR to discuss FRO's desire for their ATV traffic to cross Route 61 at Terry Rich Blvd. This is a unique situation, and PennDOT remains uncertain exactly how it should be handled. PennDOT is going to continue with further research, and FRO will develop some conceptual plans. Another teleconference has been scheduled for March 14, 2023.

Property Demolitions (31311.70)

We are working with the Borough Secretary, Code Enforcement Officer, and Solicitor to consider multiple properties for demolition using both County and Borough funds. We anticipate several properties to be advertised for demolition within the next month or two.

Little League Field Development (31226.20)

After the final plans are approved by DCNR, we will be able to advertise the project with the hope of receiving bids in April. Construction will take place at a time that is preferrable to the Little League.

Northward Court Improvements

The Borough was awarded a DCNR grant to resurface the Northward basketball courts and improve drainage on the court. The Initial Conference Call with DCNR was held on February 8, 2023. As such, the Borough can proceed with design and begin incurring costs towards the project. The Borough is also entitled to request the initial grant payment toward startup costs. It is possible that the courts could be resurfaced late in the 2023 paying season, providing DCNR approvals are timely.

SUBDIVISIONS & LAND DEVELOPMENTS

STS LD (31137.31, Task 1)

Although STS has occupied the facility, some site work will not be 100% complete before Spring 2023 due to weather restrictions. We will continue to monitor their progress before closing out the project.



AutoZone LD (31137.31, Task 3)

At your March 1, 2022, Council Meeting, Conditional Final Plan Approval was granted by Council with the major conditions being the PennDOT Driveway HOP, the PennDOT Stormwater HOP, and the Development Agreement. With the conditional approval about to expire, the Applicant submitted a time extension request with the new expiration date being June 13, 2023. The request was granted by Council at your February 7, 2023, Council Meeting. Since then, our office has received additional information, and the County has received a resubmission. We will let the Borough know when the final plans are ready for signature. No further action is required by the Borough at this time.
